#### The Mysterious History of Valentine's Day



On February 14th, people around the world celebrate romance and love by giving gifts, flowers, cards, and candy in honor of St. Valentine. But who is this mysterious saint? To understand the customs surrounding Valentine's Day, you need to look back further in history.

In ancient Rome, February was the official start of spring. The pagan festival of Lupercalia was celebrated by cleaning and purifying homes. It was also a time for matching up the city's bachelors with unmarried young women. The young ladies would put their names in a large urn. The men would choose a name and be paired up with that woman. This was done with the hope that a marriage would result. Thus, for centuries the month of February was associated with love and romance.

It wasn't until 498 A.D. that Pope Gelasius declared February 14 St. Valentine's Day. This day commemorated the martyr Valentine, a priest during the third century in Rome. According to one account, at that time, the Emperor Claudius II outlawed marriage for young men after deciding that single men made better soldiers. Valentine felt this was unjust and continued to marry couples in secret. When this was discovered, he was put to death. But not much more is known of St. Valentine, and there is some mystery surrounding the exact year of his death.

In Europe, St. Valentine's Day became a popular celebration around the seventeenth century.

Tokens of affection began to be exchanged by friends and lovers. By the end of the eighteenth century, greeting cards were being printed. It wasn't until the 1840s that people could purchase mass-produced valentines in America. Today, there are over one billion valentine cards sent each year.

### How to Ruin a Garbage Disposal

Your garbage disposal is a hard working part of your home. It can seemingly chop up<sup>c</sup> anything put into it. But it does take some care to keep your garbage disposal from becoming damaged or broken. To keep your garbage disposal running at its peak, keep these tips in mind.



- Never run your garbage disposal without

also having a strong flow of cold water going. After the grinding has stopped, continue running the water for another 30 seconds.

- Do not allow silverware or other small utensils to drop into the garbage disposal. If one does, use long-handled tongs to remove it.

- Never put your hand into your garbage disposal, even when it is turned off. Do not lean over the garbage disposal when it is running.

- Do not grind large bones or fibrous materials like corn husks, celery, asparagus ends, etc. Do not put liquid fats or grease into the garbage disposal.

- Do not let food sit in your garbage disposal. Run it each time food is placed into it.

## Green Living:

Instead of harsh chemicals, use vinegar in your home for several different cleaning applications. Vinegar can be used to clean out the deposits in a coffeemaker or steam iron. You can also use it to clean and sanitize your washing machine. Simply run your empty washer through a regular cycle, using vinegar rather than detergent.

#### Facebook

- Breach: In April 2021, a Facebook user published personal data of 533 million users worldwide.
- Effect: The phone numbers, names, locations, birthdates, bios, and email addresses of these users became fodder for identity thieves everywhere.
- **Prevention:** Incorporating the best security systems available is important for monitoring and detecting malicious activity. This includes immediately preventing data leaks and alerting about any leaks that do happen. Facebook users must also be cautious about personal information they share there. Changing to a more complicated difficult-to-guess password and updating security settings will also help. To add an extra layer of protection, implement two-factor authentication. The best way to prevent a Facebook breach of your information is to avoid using it altogether and delete your account.

#### **Colonial Pipeline**

- **Breach:** In May 2021, Colonial Pipeline, the largest US refined oil pipeline system, was hacked by cybercrime group, DarkSide, which shut down a major fuel delivery artery. The Eastern European-based group gained control of Colonial's IT network and were paid a ransom of nearly \$5 million to restore control of the network infrastructure and data.
- Effect: Colonial Pipeline's 5500 miles of pipe carries 3 million barrels of fuel each day from Texas to New York. To avoid further impact, the system was shut down for almost a week. Since Colonial distributes 45% of the US East Coast's fuel consumption, the shutdown led to panic buying, fuel shortages, and price hikes. The US government and FBI had to intervene.
- **Prevention:** Better ransomware monitoring and alerting security products could have increased prevention. Digital system remote monitoring and continuously backing up files, network assets and configurations is vital. Incorporate ransomware that continuously monitors your systems, immediately detects an attack, and shuts down the affected servers before data is encrypted. State-of-the-art products will back up all your files before they can be changed so that you have a perfectly up-to-date copy to recover from.

Staying vigilant with the best and most current malware and ransomware systems available will keep you and your business one step ahead of the crooks.
